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Initial Log-in Screen

As you can see there are visual changes to the layout, otherwise the newest feature is that you will be a history of prior news items and the news box will also have messages for other departments such as pediatrics. You will be using the same login and password as before.

Your First Screen: Set-up your profile.

Looking at Your List

For the most part it's still organized the same way. Customizable viewing is something new as well the ability to generate a quick list of your patients by any criteria you want. This flexibility allows you to organize your lists the way you want and minimize your time in generating lists daily. Most of the options are for the most part self-explanatory.

Primary:

Some of the hidden benefits of the new system is that “under the hood” of the program are new implementations to comply with HIPAA requirements. Also the database will be accessible to the primary care provider of your patient and they can make notes to help you manage your patient. For example if they know about a new medication, diagnosis or allergy they can potentially update your list with that information and make a note on changes.

New Admissions

This should be self-explanatory. What's new is that you can generate a patient as long as you fill the minimum required fields.
